Horsing Around: Meet the BCRA

Since its inception over 30 years ago, the Bell Canyon Riding Academy has gone through many variations. This past year, under the careful stewardship of trainer Kelly Jennings and BCA Board Directors Lisa Riccomini and Geoff Abadee, it has seen steady growth into a true community resource. Anyone, regardless of experience or horse ownership, can learn to ride in a caring, fun environment with the BCA. We sat down with the

BCRA instructors to find out a bit about where they came from, why they chose Bell Canyon, and their inspirations.

BCB: Tell me a little bit about yourselves and how you made your way to Bell Canyon.

Kelly Jennings: I grew up on the East Coast, working and competing. I started working with horses at 12, and worked



all the way up to college, where I majored in Equine Studies. I moved out to California after graduation and worked as an assistant trainer for a bunch of barns before starting my own barn. I came in when Kris de Graaf was managing the stable; we seemed to like each other and she offered me a spot, and I've been here ever since. I've really grown to love the community and the horses here, it's been an amazing opportunity. (continued on page 2)

(continued from page 1) **Dakota Hokanson:** I grew up riding in Utah, starting with Western and then moving to jumping. I moved out to California and joined Pony Club, going up to level C2, and I also helped fix up off the track thoroughbreds for quite a while, with a little bit of eventing here and there. After college, I moved to L.A. and found Kelly as a teacher, so, when she began at the BCEC, I followed, and she brought me on as an assistant.

Kiana Galli: I started riding horses when I was 5. My mom was like, "It's time to start lessons. Do you want to run barrels, or do you want to jump?" I looked her in the eyes and said, "I want to JUMP!" and I've been riding English ever since. I moved out from Connecticut to California to study music business; after I got my degree, I was riding at a lot of different barns, posting on Facebook looking for other horses to school, which is how Kelly found me. I started taking lessons from her, then came on as a teacher here at Bell Canyon.

BCB: It's great how you all came from such different backgrounds but ended up here teaching at the academy. Can you tell me a little more about the work you do at the BCRA and Pony Camps?

KJ: When I first started, there were a couple of Bell Canyon residents who had kids and wanted them to take lessons from me, but I didn't really have an appropriate horse. The BCRA went through a couple different iterations, with different people running it, but then it was really when Lisa Riccomini and Geoff Abadee came in and really advocated for it, with the help of Diane Rossiter, that we were able to turn it around. We've made it into something that serves the community really well and is a lot more available, professional, and complete.

BCB: So what can campers expect from Pony Camp?

KJ: We have a lot of fun things planned for the kids! There will be riding lessons every day, combined with horse care and horse education. They'll also be setting jumps and learning to jump them on foot. We want to focus on learning through play.

KG: We really want to incorporate the learning with a lot of fun, so they'll be doing things like scavenger hunts with horse colors or markings and tack pieces, races to assemble tack, and games that identify the horse body parts. They'll also be making shirts, stall cards, and painting horseshoes.

BCB: One last thing before we go: what is your favorite thing about teaching or working with horses?

DH: For me, seeing kids learn things in the horse world that they'll be able to apply to the real world. They don't know it now, but then, years down the road, it clicks.

KJ: Yeah, there's so much there. I grew up riding and training, and there's just so many life skills I learned and so many good relationships I created—horse friends are the best friends. For me, the best thing is watching the relationships form: the relationship that I build with the horse, as well as the relationship between the owner or rider and the horse. They begin to trust each other, to understand each other's languages, to work together in just this really magical way that creates so much more in each of them. Being able to see that transition into a really strong team is just so rewarding as a trainer.

KG: For me, I think it's the joy, from the little kids and from the horses. I love the joy that happens when a kid gets something right, and I'm always learning from both the kids and the horses. I love to tell the students, the horses aren't really learning from you; they're really teaching you. (*Answers have been edited or condensed for clarity.*)

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Lessons for residents start at \$60 per 30-minute, private lesson; anyone, from tiny tot, to experienced rider, is welcome to join.
